

The 10 Essential Public Health Services describe the public health activities that all communities should undertake and serve as the framework for the NPHPS instruments. Public health systems should:

1. **Monitor** health status to identify and solve community health problems.
2. **Diagnose and investigate** health problems and health hazards in the community.
3. **Inform, educate, and empower** people about health issues.
4. **Mobilize** community partnerships and action to identify and solve health problems.
5. **Develop** policies and plans that support individual and community health efforts.
6. **Enforce** laws and regulations that protect health and ensure safety.
7. **Link** people to needed personal health services and assure the provision of health care when otherwise unavailable.
8. **Assure** competent public and personal healthcare workforce.
9. **Evaluate** effectiveness, accessibility, and quality of personal and population-based health services.
10. **Research** for new insights and innovative solutions to health problems.



Prevention Block Grant

Juneau County Health Department was awarded a Prevention Block Grant-3C (Community Environmental Health Hazard Control) in the amount of \$4,182.84. We allocated 100% of this grant to Sauk County Health Department to act as fiscal agent.

Radon Grant

A Radon Grant was awarded to the Health Departments in Adams County, Sauk County, and Juneau County. Juneau County's portion of this grant was \$1,919.00. We allocated 100% of this grant to Sauk County Health Department to act as a fiscal agent.

Limited Agent Program

Facilities designated by the Department of Health and Family Services including campgrounds, hotels, motels, vending machines, etc. are inspected annually in Adams, Juneau, and Sauk Counties. Juneau County's portion of this grant is \$23,216.00. We allocated 100% of this grant to Sauk County Health Department to act as a fiscal agent.

Transient Non-Community Water Testing

A grant was received to provide yearly sampling of all transient non-community water systems for bacteria and nitrates in Adams, Juneau, and Sauk Counties. Juneau County's portion of this grant was in the amount of \$22,290.00.

Wisconsin Department of Agriculture and Consumer Protection Agent Retail Food Program

To assure safe and sanitary retail food facilities and retail food products, the Juneau County Health Department has been authorized to become the designated agent of the State of Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade, and Consumer Protection for the purpose making investigations of retail food establishments. Juneau County's portion for the inspections conducted in Juneau County for 2014 was \$14,463.00.

Education for New Public Health Professionals

In 2015, the Juneau County Health Department provided six students internship training and education. Students were from UW-Madison, Viterbo University, The Medical College of Wisconsin and AmeriCorps.

NURSE FAMILY PARTNERSHIP

Program Overview

Nurse Family Partnership(NFP) helps families and the communities they live in become stronger while saving money for state, local and federal governments. It is estimated that for every public health dollar invested in high-risk NFP families, communities will see more than five dollars in return.

A local Community Advisory Board (CAB) comprised of collaborative partners meets quarterly to support the NFP program in Juneau County. The CAB includes representation from a local OB provider, UW-Extension Family Living Agent, a librarian, law enforcement, WTC, a school nurse, and a volunteer food pantry and community member.

In October of 2015, the health department received Family Foundations Comprehensive Home Visiting funding that allowed the program to serve additional families.





Services Provided


NFP is an evidence-based, community health program that serves low-income women pregnant with their first child. Each vulnerable new mom is partnered with a registered nurse early in her pregnancy and receives ongoing nurse home visits until her child turns 2.

NFP program goals are to: 1) improve pregnancy outcomes 2) improve child health & development 3) improve the self-sufficiency of the family





NFP Benchmarks
 Preterm births 11.4% or less
 Low Birth Wgt. 7.8% or less



2015 NFP Outcomes

- 26 women enrolled in NFP
- 100% client retention in pregnancy phase
- 100% of babies born >37 weeks gestation
- 100% of infants up-to-date on immunizations at 12 months
- 33.3% still breastfeeding at 12 months
- None of the women have had subsequent pregnancies

- **Healthiest Wisconsin 2020 Objective:**
 By 2020, provide pre-conception and inter-conception care to Wisconsin women in population groups disproportionately affected by poor birth outcomes.
- **Healthy People 2020 Objective:**
 Reduce low birth weight (LBW) and very low birth weight (VLBW); Reduce preterm births; Increase the proportion of pregnant women who receive early and adequate prenatal care.

HealthCheck Program

Program Overview

HealthCheck exams are a head-to-toe physical assessment and may include screening for growth and development, dental health, hearing and vision, nutrition, and blood lead. Age appropriate immunizations are also offered during the visit.

Dental health is a strong focus of the HealthCheck program. The application of fluoride varnish is offered to all children who are on Medical Assistance (MA) or WIC programs, age 9 months up to 6 years. This screening includes a dental assessment, anticipatory guidance, fluoride varnish application, and dental referral.

Juneau County offers a Fluoride Supplement Program to address the needs of children whose drinking water doesn't meet optimal fluoridated levels.

Services Provided


HealthCheck screenings are offered to MA children age birth to 21 years of age. Varnishes are offered to children 9 months to 6 years of age on MA and/or WIC. The fluoride supplements are offered to children ages 6 months to 16 years of age in Juneau County.



Number of HealthCheck Exams Yearly






Application of a fluoride varnish

2015 HealthCheck Outcomes

- **0** Children received full HealthCheck Exams
- **198** varnishes were completed
- **15** referrals were made for further dental follow up with dentists
- **9** Children received fluoride supplements.

Juneau/Adams WIC (Women, Infants, and Children) Program

Program Overview

WIC's purpose is to promote and maintain the health and well-being of nutritionally at-risk pregnant, breastfeeding and postpartum women, infants, and children.

Juneau/Adams WIC is a dual-county project, funded by a grant from the USDA.

With a caseload of 1154 participants, Juneau/Adams WIC held clinics throughout each month at eight different sites to best serve their participants.




In 2015 Juneau/Adams WIC supported breastfeeding by issuing a total of 80 pumps and accessories.

Services Provided

WIC provides a welcoming place for families to learn how positive food and lifestyle choices can be incorporated into their daily lives. The positive choices during pregnancy, postpartum, breastfeeding, infancy, and childhood have been proven to improve outcomes.

WIC provides

- Nutrition education
- Breastfeeding education and support
- Supplemental nutritious foods
- Referrals to other health and nutrition services





We welcomed a new WIC Director in November, Valerie Pampuch, RD.

2015 WIC Outcomes

- EBT WIC cards replaced WIC checks in May
- \$443,787 used to buy 17,653 items at grocery stores in Juneau and Adams counties
- \$385 used on average per participant on food redemption
- 96% Project eligible participants served
- 90% State eligible participants served
- 83% of postpartum mothers within our project attempt breastfeeding, compared to 73% statewide

Farmers' Market Nutrition Program (FMNP)

Program Overview

WIC FMNP Goal: “to provide fresh, nutritious unprepared foods, such as fruits and vegetables, from farmers’ markets to women, infants and children who are nutritionally at-risk”.

WIC families are provided a one-time \$17 worth of checks funded from the USDA. They are allowed to use their own money in addition to these checks.

There are four Farmers’ Markets in Juneau and Adams County that have farmers’ who can accept WIC FMNP checks.

- Mauston Farmers Market
- Adams Hazel Street Market
- Necedah Farm Market
- Elroy WIC Market

Juneau and Adams Co. WIC program certified five additional farmers in 2015 . We now have a total of 14 farmers in our community that are able to accept FMNP checks.

2015 Juneau/Adams WIC FMNP Outcomes

- **560** families were issued FMNP checks.
- **81%** of those families issued the FMNP checks used all or some of their checks.
- **\$4,473** was spent in the community at local farm stands.
- Our projects redemption rate was **47%** compared to the state redemption rate is at 46%.



The season begins June 1 through October 31.

Fit Families

Program Overview

The Fit Families Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program (SNAP-Ed) is a successful behavior change program targeting primarily families of 2-3 year old children enrolled in WIC at Fit Families projects in Wisconsin

Fit Families strives to help prevent childhood overweight/obesity and is collaborating with other SNAP-Ed projects and partners on this effort.

Services Provided

2015 was the second year Juneau/Adams WIC offered this service to our clients. We had an assigned caseload of **50** participants.

Our coaches:

- Enrolled **50** children in the program,
- **36** children continuing through the end of 2015

Core Messages

Core messages:

- **Move More...Watch Less**
Encourage Fit Families participants to engage in active play or physical activity for at least 60 minutes every day to reduce screen time to two hours or less each day.
- **Make Every Bite Count...More Fruits and Vegetables**
Encourage children and their parents to eat the recommended amount of fruits and vegetables each day.
- **Make Every Sip Count...More Healthy Beverages**
Encourage families to reduce or eliminate use of sugared beverages.

Over-arching message:

- **Eat Healthy, Be Active: Your Kids are Watching**
Encourage parents to be good role models for their children.

WIC Breastfeeding Peer Counselor Program

Program Overview


- Purpose of the program is to aid WIC eligible moms in reaching their breastfeeding goals through breastfeeding counseling through telephone and clinic visits.
- WIC breastfeeding moms receive breastfeeding informational handouts, relevant to their infant's current milestones to aid with breastfeeding.
- WIC also partners with the OB Department at Mile Bluff Hospital to help with breastfeeding initiation at birth and critical first few days in the hospital.



In 2015, increased breastfeeding exclusivity at 6 months from 14.9% to 19.5%.

Services Provided


- Approximately 200 pregnant and breastfeeding WIC participants served within Juneau/Adams counties.
- Pre-and post-natal care in regards to infant feeding.
- Provide guidance in breastfeeding techniques and normal baby behaviors.
- Assist participants in obtaining breastpumps and accessories when necessary, through participants insurance or WIC rental pump program.



Hospital grade Medela rental pumps are available to WIC clients as needs are assessed.



Introductory handout about peer working with moms is given at clinic or mailed to participants.



Moms receive newsletters about breastfeeding at birth, 3 weeks, 3 months, and 6 months about feeding at those milestones.

2015 WIC Breastfeeding Peer Counselor Outcomes

Goals:

- Continue to maintain state WIC goal of 82% or higher breastfeeding incidence.
 - In 2015, maintained state WIC incidence of breastfeeding at 83.1% or higher and breastfeeding incidence at 1 month of 77.4% or higher.
- Continue to maintain and increase breastfeeding duration at indicators of 3, 6, 12 months.
- Increase breastfeeding exclusivity rates
 - In 2015, increased breastfeeding exclusivity at 6 months from 14.9% to 19.5%.

Other Guiding Goals

- **Healthiest People 2020 Objective:**
 - Increase proportion of infants ever breastfed.
 - Increase proportion of infants who are breastfed at 6 months and 1 year.
 - Increase proportion of infants who are breastfed exclusively at 3 months and 6 months.

PRENATAL CARE COORDINATION

Program Overview

Research has demonstrated the link between social and economic stressors of women who are pregnant with poor birth outcomes. Juneau County provides access to medical, social, and educational services to high-risk pregnant women through our Prenatal Care Coordination (PNCC) Program to improve birth outcomes.

PNCC is a voluntary case management program that high-risk pregnant women on Medicaid are eligible to participate in until 60 days postpartum. The components of the program include: outreach, physical and emotional assessments, care plan development, ongoing care coordination, and health and nutrition counseling.

In Juneau County, the public health nurses and WIC registered dietitians collaborate to provide PNCC services.





Services Provided

PNCC helps pregnant women get the support and services they need to have a healthy pregnancy and a healthy baby.

PNCC services include: pregnancy information and education, referrals and information on community programs, help finding an OB provider, social support, childbirth class referrals, nutritional counseling, First Breath services, breastfeeding support, depression screenings, safe sleep information, and car seat inspections.



Clients admitted to PNCC




Child Passenger Safety

Program Overview

The Juneau County Health Department knows it's not an easy task to find the right car seat. After all, there are several types of seats – from infant to booster. The type of seat also depends on your child's age and size. Even after you find the right one, it's important to know how to install your car seat correctly and when to transition your child to another type of seat as your child grows older.

Did you know **that national statistics show that three out of every four car seats are installed incorrectly?**

The health department has been helping parents with their child's car seats for the past 15 years. The general purpose of this program is to make sure that the residents of Juneau County have access to proper car seat education and safe child passenger safety seats for their children.




Services Provided

The Juneau County Health Department has four staff members that are nationally certified as Child Passenger Safety Technicians. These individuals are available by appointment to instruct caregivers on installation, provide education, and inspect car seats.


A grant is available from the Department of Transportation to help purchase child car seats for families in need. Juneau County has received this grant for the past seven years.

Keeping Kids Alive Juneau County Child Death Review Team

Program Overview

In 2015, Juneau County maintained a multi-agency, multi-professional Child Death Review Team. The team reviews the deaths of children under 24 years of age quarterly. The outcomes of the reviews are to identify preventable child deaths and provide recommendations for interventions and prevention strategies. Juneau County's team consists of a variety of public health partners including local and county law enforcement, education, health department, human services, child protective services, coroner, pediatrician, local clinic and hospital staff, county corporation counsel, and district attorney. The ultimate goal of this team is to prevent future childhood deaths from occurring in our communities.

Cribs for Kids of Juneau County

Program Overview and Services Provided

Cribs for Kids is a program supported by a system of community partners to educate the public on the importance of infant safe sleep. A grant we received allows us to be able to provide Graco Pack 'N Play's to families in need of a safe place for their infant to sleep. Follow-up calls are made to anyone who receives a crib, both at two weeks and three months, after distribution to make sure everything is working and to reinforce proper usage.





Disease Control and Prevention

Program Overview

Communicable diseases remain a major cause of illness, disability, and death. Local health departments are responsible for investigating and controlling further spread of disease. Surveillance, investigation, and follow-up of reportable diseases are the statutory responsibilities of the health department. Juneau County Health Department (JCHD) follow-up assures individuals receive appropriate treatment and provides health education on ways to prevent further spread of these diseases within the community. JCHD tracks the type and number of reportable diseases and identifies patterns and trends of communicable disease occurrence within the county. Providers receive a quarterly report of communicable disease occurrences in Juneau County.





- Infection control consultation to providers, schools, and long term care facilities.
- Developed Ebola protocol in collaboration with WI DPH to ensure investigated safely and appropriately providing the best care to the individual while protecting healthcare workers and residents of Juneau County.
- TB prevention and control including follow-up of latent TB and active TB disease cases to prevent TB exposure in the community.
- Participated in the Get Yourself Tested (GYT) initiative, partnering with Family Planning to increase public information on the importance of STD risk awareness & testing.

Facts about Norovirus

Norovirus is the leading cause of outbreaks of diarrhea and vomiting in the U.S. and spreads quickly.

Norovirus spreads by contact with an infected person or by touching a contaminated surface or eating contaminated food or drinking contaminated water. Norovirus particles can even float through the air and land on surfaces, spreading contamination.

Norovirus particles are extremely small and billions of them are in the stool and vomit of infected people. Any vomit or diarrhea may contain norovirus and should be treated as though it does.

IMMUNIZATIONS

Program Overview

Appropriate administration of safe and effective vaccines is one of the most successful and cost effective public health tools for preventing disease. Vaccines prevent disease in the people who receive them, and provide indirect protection called “herd immunity” to others in the community who are not fully immunized. Children under two years of age are especially vulnerable to childhood disease, making it critical that they be protected through immunization.

The Juneau County Health Department collaborates with community partners in the local Mile Bluff Immunization Committee, which works to improve immunization rates and access in Juneau County. The Health department continues to be an active member of the Coulee Region Immunization Committee (CRIC).



Immunizations are considered one of the greatest public health achievements in the 20th century.


Services Provided

The Juneau County Health Department provides childhood immunizations through the Vaccines for Children (VFC) program. These state supplied vaccines target children with no health insurance, underinsured, Medicaid, or the Native American/Alaskan Native.


The Health department increases community access to vaccines by offering seasonal influenza clinics and Adult Hepatitis B vaccines.

The Health department also participates in county-wide school mass influenza clinics.



Seal-A-Smile

Program Overview

The Juneau County Health Department receives grant funding for its Seal-A-Smile (SAS) Program. This program is overseen by the Children Health Alliance. The SAS program was initiated in Juneau County in 2010.

The Juneau County Health Department contracts with a Registered Dental Hygienist and a Dental Assistant. A public health nurse coordinates the program and provides case management with in-kind match funds. The Health Department collaborates with local schools, A Fluoride Connection (Katie Traut, RDH), and the Mauston Dental Center.





Community Health Needs Assessment

Program Overview

State Statute HFS 140.04 requires each local health department with their community stakeholders to complete a community health needs assessment and a plan to improve the health of its population.

The Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act require all non-profit 501(c) (3) hospitals to conduct a community health needs assessment and adopt an implementation strategy at least once every three years.

The Mile Bluff Medical Center (MBMC) and Juneau County Health Department partner together to meet these responsibilities.

Services Provided

In April 2013, Mile Bluff Medical Center and the Juneau County Health Department, along with a group of diverse stakeholders, completed a 2013 Community Health Needs Assessment targeting Juneau County.

The assessment included a comprehensive overview of the most current health data available as well as a comparison of health trends locally with national health trends and community partner input.

Health priorities identified:

- Parenting
- Access to health care (mental, medical, and dental)
- Health literacy
 - Reduction of obesity, especially among children (Nutrition/Physical Activity) and
- Promotion of healthy lifestyles/healthy communities.

An Implementation Plan was created to address the above noted health priorities and is reviewed annually.

The County Health Rankings report was used as the foundation for the community health needs assessment process and is used for monitoring the health outcomes progress for Juneau County residents. The 2016 Snapshot of Juneau County, County Health Rankings, follows.

South Central Wisconsin Tobacco Free Coalition

Program Overview

The South Central Wisconsin Tobacco Free Coalition collaborates with educators, law enforcement, elected state and local officials, health professionals, youth, and citizens to create healthier communities.

Juneau County Health Department is the fiscal agent and home of the South Central Wisconsin Tobacco Free Coalition (SCWTFC) serving Juneau, Adams, Richland, and Sauk Counties. The Wisconsin Tobacco Prevention and Control Program (TPCP) provides funding and outlines objectives for the coalition. The coalition is guided by an executive committee of public health officials from the four counties.

Juneau County Health Department has organized and staffed the SCWTFC since 2010 and Juneau County efforts prior to 2010.

Services Provided

The SCWTFC provides state and local partners, policy makers, and community members with current tobacco prevention information and local data. Current tobacco news and research is shared via face to face meetings, email blasts, quarterly newsletters, and media outreach. Additionally, the coalition promotes the Wisconsin Tobacco QuitLine.


Since 2012, SCWTFC has partnered with Mauston High School to provide a youth tobacco prevention program, FACT, to students. Members of the Mauston High School FACT group educated their peers about the dangers of tobacco.

In partnership with the Juneau County Sheriff's Office, the SCWTFC completed 43 tobacco retailer compliance checks in 2015 through the WI Wins Program.



Wisconsin Well Woman Program

Program Overview

The Wisconsin Well Woman Program (WWWP) is a breast and cervical cancer screening program funded by the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) and the State of Wisconsin. The goal of WWWP is to improve access to preventative health services for low-income, uninsured or under-insured women; to eliminate preventable death and disability from breast and cervical cancer, particularly among medically under-served women.

Since the initiation of WWWP in 1994 the Juneau County Health Department has coordinated the program for three counties. (Adams, Juneau, Sauk) Starting July 1, 2015, the Juneau County Health Department now coordinates services for ten counties. (Adams, Columbia, Dodge, Grant, Green, Iowa, Juneau, Lafayette, Richland, and Sauk.) The Health Officers from each county are updated on program specifics throughout the year.

Services Provided

WWWP pays for mammograms, Pap tests, certain other health screenings, and multiple sclerosis testing for women with high-risk signs of multiple sclerosis.

The local coordinator's role is to determine eligibility, enrollments, provide case management, assist with billing and reimbursement, and report local activity to WWWP state office.

Eligibility requirements:

- Wisconsin resident
- Ages 35-64
- Uninsured or under-insured
- At or below 250% of the federal poverty level

Rabies Control

Program Overview

The goals of the program are to provide a uniform county-wide response to animal bite complaints, prevent human exposure to rabies by eliminating rabid animals, and encourage exposed persons to receive proper wound care and appropriate passive and active immunizations.

The Juneau County Health Department works to coordinate and communicate with the physicians of the exposed individual on the status of animal and current protocol of the Wisconsin State Lab of Hygiene. We also coordinate follow up with the local veterinarians, law enforcement officials, and if needed the State Epidemiologist.

Juneau County Health Department also provides the public with education on rabies prevention through newsletters and other educational handouts.

Services Provided

Juneau County rabies prevention control provides a wide variety of services to any resident of Juneau County as appropriate and/or any individual bitten while in the county's jurisdiction. Some of those services may include; the assessment of any individuals bitten to assure proper wound care/treatment, vaccinations status and follow up, contact with pet owners to inform them of their responsibilities regarding follow up of their animal(s), and verify with veterinarians quarantine and/or observation services for the animal. Services also include follow up with possible exposure to bats and other wild animals. The health department reports any non-compliance to the local law authorities.


2015 Case Breakdown by Injured Age

Childhood Lead

Program Overview

The lead program's goal is to identify children who are at high risk for lead poisoning, offer blood lead screening of these children, and provide the necessary follow-up in the event of elevated blood lead levels. Education regarding proper nutrition, risk reduction, and abatement are integral components of the program.

The environmental health registered sanitarian, WIC staff, physicians, and public health nurse each have specific roles in the program and work collaboratively to achieve the common goal of reducing the incidence of lead poisoning in Juneau County children.



2015 Lead Outcomes

- **307** blood lead test completed at WIC visits
- **10** children tested at the **5 to 9 ug/dl** level.
- **1** child was **above 10 ug/dl level**
- **7** children are still under case management by the public health nurse.

Services Provided

At least two lead screenings are performed on children between 1 year and 5 years old that are in for WIC.

The public health nurse follows up with all children in Juneau County with an elevated blood level >5ug/dl. The nurse will provide risk assessments, education on nutrition, and steps to lower blood lead levels, and offer home inspections.

Home inspections are completed by the environmental health registered sanitarian and the public health nurse with the client.



Environmental Health Hazards

Program Overview

The goal of this program is to assess and abate possible human health hazards and nuisances. Complaints can include, but are not limited to: unfit buildings, asbestos, insect and rodent control, indoor and outdoor air quality, noxious odors, noise, mold, exotic animals, solid waste, and any other unsanitary conditions. South Central Environmental Health Consortium (SCEHC) staff collect, evaluate, investigate, and enforce complaint or concerns regarding these types of issues. The foundation of the program is Wisconsin State Statutes and the local county ordinance, "Abating Public Nuisance Affecting the Public Health" which enable SCEHC to take enforcement action.


Funding is from the Prevention Block Grant, Division of Public Health and County tax levy.

Radon

Program Overview

The South Central Environmental Health Consortium is a Radon Information Center (RIC) for Adams, Juneau, Sauk, and Columbia Counties.

The goal of the Radon Program is to advance public awareness of radon through education and outreach. Radon is the second leading cause of lung cancer.

Funding is provided through the state Consolidated Contract, Division of Public Health, Environmental Protective Agency (EPA) and county tax levy.

Services Provided

Educational materials are distributed through the media, health department website, and Facebook.


Radon testing kits are offered and radon measurement outcomes are evaluated based on the following:

*0 – 3.9 pCi/L – Radon levels are under the recommended EPA Action Level. It is recommended that retesting of the home should be done every 2-3 years to ensure radon levels have not increased. No levels of radon are considered safe.

*4.0 – 8.0 pCi/L – Radon levels are above the recommended EPA Action Level. Retesting should be conducted to verify the results of the first test. If results again are 4.0 – 8.1pCi/L, mitigation is recommended.

*> 8.1 pCi/L – Radon levels are well above the recommended EPA Action Level. Retesting should be conducted immediately. If results again are 8.1 pCi/L, mitigation is recommended.

Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) Transient Non-Community Well Water (TNR) - Agent


Program Overview

The South Central Environmental Health Consortium, representing Sauk, Juneau, and Adams counties, is an agent with the DNR to detect construction, location, maintenance, and operational deficiencies within well water systems before unsafe conditions occur.

Systems must meet the definition of a TNC potable water supply system in order to be included in the program.

Systems are tested for harmful levels of bacteria and nitrates annually. Once every five years systems receive a sanitary survey which is an inspection of the entire system and distribution points. An audit of the program is completed yearly.

Funding is through the Department of Natural Resources and sampling fees.



Annual water tests are conducted to determine bacteria and nitrate levels.

Services Provided

- Provide yearly sampling of all TNC water systems for bacteria and nitrates.
- A sanitary Survey is completed on 20% of all TNC systems to ensure compliance with code requirements

DNR recommends you test your private well at least once a year for coliform bacteria contamination and any time you notice a change in how the water looks, tastes, or smells. Even if your water looks, tastes, and smells good, it can contain harmful bacteria and viruses.

- Managing spread of disease via isolating or quarantining as appropriate





Substance Abuse Free Environment (SAFE) in Juneau County Coalition

Coalition History

SAFE was established in the later part of 2014 as a result of continuous poor County Health Rankings and the Juneau Co. Community Needs Assessments (CNA) from 2009 and 2013. CNA data further revealed that many of Juneau Co. individuals diagnosed with mental health issues also experience comorbidity with substance use (alcohol, tobacco, or other drug) disorders, which generates poor health outcomes.

SAFE mobilizes key stakeholders from public health, law enforcement, health care, businesses, human services, faith-based organizations, parents, youth, schools, youth serving agencies, and citizens to create a community where youth can grow and thrive in a healthy environment.

SAFE has become a well-established agent of change in Juneau Co. by systematically identifying and challenging local behaviors, norms, and conditions that have been the foundation of a multitude of health problems. The coalition is leveraging a high level of community readiness to tackle tobacco, alcohol, and prescription drug problems.

SAFE's Action Plan

SAFE's mission is to improve the lives of children, youth and adults by mobilizing communities to prevent and treat alcohol, tobacco and prescription drugs in Juneau County.

In 2015, SAFE developed an action plan for prevention activities and events to complete in the upcoming year. Activities include; coalition building, alcohol prevention, prescription drug prevention, and tobacco prevention.

Activities will place an emphasis on youth to prevent health-related problem behaviors from developing by having prevention programs, community awareness campaigns, and a cultural shift with changes to drug and alcohol policies.

- "Cleaning up the Pond – The prescriber's role in preventing prescription drug abuse" was presented at Grand Rounds to medical providers at Mile Bluff Medical Center.
- All **5** school districts in Juneau County have agreed to conduct the Online Youth Risk Behavior Survey in 2016.
- SAFE will apply for a Drug Free Communities Grant in March of 2016. The grant funding will provide 125,000 dollars annually for five years for drug prevention activities in Juneau County.

Health Coverage Grant

Program Overview and Services Provided

A grant was received through the Division of Health Care Access and Accountability to assist residents with applications and renewals for Wisconsin's ForwardHealth programs and the Health Insurance Marketplace.

The Juneau County Health Department (JCHD) was successful in outreaching for these services through Wisconsin Well Women Program clients, WIC clients, Prenatal Care Coordination clients, and other public health visits.

The JCHD had two staff members who became re-certified as Certified Application Counselors through online training provided by the Health Insurance Marketplace.

Services provided included assisting with BadgerCare, Family Planning Waiver, Wisconsin FoodShare and the Health Insurance Marketplace applications.



Program Overview

The South Central Environmental Consortium (SCEHC) representing Sauk, Juneau, and Adams counties, is an agent with the WDATCP to assure safe and sanitary retail food facilities

SCEHC became a designated agent of the WDATCP for the purpose of establishing its own permit fees, issuing permits, collecting samples, and completing investigations of retail food establishments

Funding is through licensing and inspection fees.



The goal of the WDATCP Agent program is to assure safe and sanitary retail food facilities.

Services Provided

- Annually inspect facilities per contract with the WDATCP. These facilities include supermarkets, groceries, delis and other retail food establishments which sell for retail potentially hazardous food products.

Juneau County Suicide Prevention Coalition

Program Overview

The Juneau County Suicide Prevention Coalition was established in May of 2015 as a result of the Child Death Review Team's recommendations. These recommendations were made due to a high number of adolescent suicides in Juneau county over a two year time span.

Members of the coalition include; local and county law enforcement, public health, human services, coroner, health care, education, citizens, mental health providers, pediatrician, faith based organization, the Department of Corrections, and the Ho-Chunk Nation.

The Juneau County Suicide Prevention Coalition hosted a Survivors of Suicide Event for the community in November. This event was for anyone who had been effected by suicide. The first annual Suicide Prevention Walk was held in September and was a success. The goal was to spread awareness to the community and bring hope to those affected by suicide. Another goal was to raise funds for training and educational materials. One of the next plans for the coalition is to provide QPR training to the local school districts.



Vision Statement

A suicide free community where people will recognize the warning signs, intervene, and help individuals find hope.

What is QPR training?

- QPR is an evidence based approach to confronting someone about their possible thoughts of suicide.
- People trained in QPR learn how to recognize the warning signs of a suicide crisis and how to question, persuade, and refer someone to help.
- **Question:** Question the person about suicide.
- **Persuade:** Persuade the person to get help.
- **Refer:** Refer them for help.

Mission Statement

Because we value human life, the mission of Juneau County Suicide Prevention Coalition is to prevent suicide through awareness, education, collaboration, and improved access to mental health care.
